The call and response of West African tradition illustrates the experience of the AACC Dance & Drum Performance Company as part of DanceAfrica 2014.

DanceAfrica founder and director "Baba Chuck" Davis came to Buffalo to audition the AACC dancers and drummers in November 2013.

"He was canvassing Upstate New York for dance and drum companies to perform in DanceAfrica 2014. Our company was selected to participate from among 10 regional companies," AACC contract administrator Tammy Gaines said.

Established in 1977, DanceAfrica is the nation's largest celebration dedicated to African dance, and the longest-running annual program of

the 150-year-old Brooklyn Academy of Music (BAM). BAM is a multi-arts center that engages global and local communities, and showcases emerging artists with world-renowned programming in theater, dance, music, opera, film and other genres.

Before leaving for Brooklyn, Baba Chuck came to Buffalo to work one-on-one with the AACC company. "He provided a unique experience for us. We were all honored to have been under his tutelage," Gaines said.

At BAM, the AACC was part of

five performances with Asase Yaa and Restoration of New York City, and Bakomanga from Madagascar, the DanceAfrica 2014 featured artist.

"Each company brought exciting and exhilarating performances to the stage. Music and dance are inseparable. Each is like a manifestation of the other," said Gaines.

In addition to Gaines, the following company members traveled to BAM for DanceAfrica 2014: company co-administrator Linda Barr; Lynette Simmons and Youssou Lo, artistic directors; dancers Netanya Thompson, Shyana Broughton, Janae Brown, Onija Martin and Megan Lestak; and drummers Brandon Gaines, Denzell Cottrell, Anthony Gaines and Marvin Harris.

AACC participation was made possible through BAM funding from the New York State Council on the Arts, with support from Governor Andrew Cuomo and the New York State Legislature.



Tammy L. Gaines earned her M.E. degree in business and marketing from Buffalo State College. She is now a certified teacher at Bennett High School, and continues to work at AACC as contract administrator and marketing assistant.



PRT'S Paulette Harris Takes Center Stage

Paul Robeson Theatre artistic director Paulette D. Harris has had a laurel-filled year. She earned her B.S. degree in arts from Empire State College in 2013, and taught"Black Drama in America" as an adjunct professor during the spring 2014 semester at Buffalo State College.



In March, Harris was included among 29 community leaders honored at the 5th Annual Roses for Outstanding Women awards program. Over the summer, she wrote two of the five PRT 2014 – 2015 season productions.

Harris serves as board secretary for the Arts Services Initiative of Western New York: in October, her alma mater named her a distinguished alumnus, and she received an inaugural Alemaedae Theatre Award for her role as a Buffalo theater mentor. In addition, under her leadership the Paul Robeson Theatre captured a 2014 International Center for Women Playwrights 50/50 Applause Award, given to theaters that produced 50 percent or more women playwrights in their season.



Energetic, multi-talented and sophisticated, Ayana Williams, the new director of the AACC Educational Directives After School (EDAS) program, is sure to have a lasting impact on the children she nurtures every day:

"Growing up in an urban community, it is easy to get caught up in negative things. With this program, we're helping children to push beyond barriers, break them, and keep on going."

Buffalo born and raised – an honors graduate of McKinley High School – Williams earned her B.A. in psychology with a minor in theater and entrepreneurship from Daemen College in 2013.

She came to the AACC in October 2013 as an intern, volunteered as a Paul Robeson Theatre usher the following spring, and made her PRT stage debut last season in *Branches from the Same Tree*. Previous acting credits include the role of Beneatha in a Daemen College production of *A Raisin in the Sun*, and working as an extra in the movie *Best Man Holiday*.

Williams taught Theater and Self-Awareness in the 2014 AACC Jumpin' Jambalaya Summer Program. While her first love is acting, she says her psychology background supports her in her new role as EDAS director, and in other areas as well: "It helps me every day, dealing with the children, dealing with myself, becoming more patient and understanding about human nature."

EDAS serves East Side Buffalo school children from kindergarten through the 12th grade. Enrollment is free; children are dropped off by school bus, and receive homework help and life skills training. In addition to Williams the EDAS staff includes Earmie Beason, Marshawn Goodrum, Arthur Clark and Terri Polk.
